


Music for Solo Clarinet, Josè Daniel Cirigliano TACTUS TC930002

I must say that I have an affinity towards pushing the boundaries of sound possibilities when listening to music played on the clarinet, an instrument that has an inherently homogenous timbre. Josè Daniel Cirigliano's recording *Music for Solo Clarinet* does this in a uniquely captivating fashion. The recording features music from Italian composers Guido López GAVILÁN (b.1944) *Clariloquio* (2008), Alessandra RAVERA (b.1977) *La scatola del tempo* (2006), Antonio FRAIOLI (b.1966) *4 Pezzi* (2012) *I miei occhi* (2017), William O SMITH (b.1922) *Meditations* (1990) *Five Pieces* (1959), Bruno BETTINELLI (1933-2004) *Studio da concerto* (1971), Giacinto SCELSE (1905-1988) *Ixor II* (1954), Giovanni MATTALIANO (b.1969) *Zeta World* (2011) as well as from American clarinetist and composer, William O. Smith. Cirigliano's beautifully expressive sound and his wide palette of expressive and technical capabilities challenge the listener to engage in a listening experience where one can focus on his interpretive ideas through each seemingly complex contemporary work for solo clarinet, while simultaneously allowing the listener to engage in this music in a completely opposite manner—one in which the listener simply relaxes and takes in the tapestry of colors he paints. In my own listening experience, I find my attention leans towards the second approach. Trusting the artist to guide me through their impression of form, structure and spirit in each work. Cirigliano escorts the listener on a sonic journey through carefully selected, beautifully comprehensible late twentieth and early twenty-first century solo clarinet music. This recording is an important contribution to the canon of important clarinet repertoire. More importantly, though, it takes the listener through this music in a uniquely solitary manner, with the focus on Cirigliano's deep and pensive expressions of these important mostly Italian composers' works.
